As I remained steadfast, I saw I had been true to myself, *regardless of the consequences.*

After that firing, facing financial insecurity, I trusted Higher Power that I would be taken care of.

Job or no job, I am assured, in prayer and in faith, that I am in charge of my reactions to situations. I remember there were no mistakes in Higher Power's world and I have faith another door will open for me when it is my turn.

Integrity is the confidence that comes from not compromising what is important: being true to oneself, regardless of what happens. Today I stand in faith with Higher Power.
